#### **Paired Reading**

Have you ever tried 'paired reading' as a strategy when reading with your children? It can be fun and will definitely help and encourage readers who are lacking in confidence or who are struggling with fluency.

'Paired reading' is reading together with the child at the same pace, ensuring that your voice is quietly there in the background, providing support. You will find that this method will assist hesitancy and gloss over any mistakes made by a reluctant reader. It will, therefore, help them to understand and enjoy the text and they will not just be' barking at print'. Hopefully, you will be able to build trust.

It is rather like holding a child's hand and then gradually letting go when they are able to become more independent. It also resembles learning to ride a bike. We can hold the saddle until the child is ready and able to pedal off freely without our help. Why not give it a go?!



### **Links with St Peter's Church**

We have loved the Open the Book team sharing Biblical stories with us this half term. Whether our belief is in the Christian God or other faith or none, our hope is by sharing thought provoking stories, values and delving deeper into reflecting on these forms of Worship, we can encourage thought and impact on each and every life. Helping our children to see the hope that is beyond, the choices that they make that lead to the impact on others and the ultimate self reflection on our relationships. 



#### **OUR SCHOOL NEEDS YOUR HELP!**

Did you know that registering for Pupil Premium means that your child's school gets extra money?

Please take 5 minutes to check if you are eligible! Schools can decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

At Pimperne Primary School we support all of our pupils. We do this by providing high quality classroom teaching which is supplemented by interventions to support venerable learners as and when required. The School Leadership Team and Governing Body monitor the impact of all spending and interventions including Pupil Premium. For further information please refer to the school 'Pupil Premium Policy'.

If you think you may be able to support your child's school further by completing the application due to low income or because your child is a Looked After or Cared for Child – please do! Every bit of additional funding the school receives plays a huge part in maintaining our belief in supporting every single child in our school.

Pupil Premium – most people who are in receipt of one of these are eligible for Pupil Premium Funding:

- · Income Support
- · Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- · Income-related Employment an Support Allowance
- $\cdot$  Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- · The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- $\cdot$  Child Tax Credit. This is as long as you are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and your annual gross income isn't more than £16,190
- · Working Tax Credit 'run-on' payment (paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- · Universal Credit with an income of no more than £7,400

#### PLEASE DON'T UNDO OUR TEACHING

As a school, we believe that opportunities to teach road safety are

important. From Reception class up, we ensure that our 'out and about visits' model safe practice near roads, crossings and pavement usage. Please may we ask that whilst on school site you too model appropriate road safety use to your child/ ren. Children should only be using a marked pavement or pathway to enter or exit school, with or without an adult. The school drive does not have a pavement from the road. A mixed message for children could result in them taking unnecessary risks in the future, thinking 'it's ok as my family do it'. It's a small thing with unthinkable consequences. Please back us

on supporting the safety of your child!



## Year 2 Garden Project

I would just like to share with you my thanks. You may have heard and/or been talked into supplying items for the Year 2 garden project - thank you. Today I have realised just how much this 'garden project' has meant to the children, as many have shared their independent writing with me. They have chosen to write in a range of genres from narra-

tive accounts to poetry - all inspired by the teamwork that has led to this really lovely space, in the outdoor learning area of year 2. My thanks also goes to the Year 2 team, Mrs Edwards who has led much of the practical work alongside Mrs Mathlin and Mrs Dunford. Visiting staff have also helped out!

Although, the team planned the activity to encompass moments of inspiration and awe - you can never guarantee that these happen.
